Dear Dr. Gallaudet

August McInnes will sail from Glasgow by the Anchor Line S. S. Astoria on Saturday, the 15<sup>th</sup> September, due to arrive in New York on or about the 25<sup>th</sup> September, and he should reach you on the 26<sup>th</sup>. Will you kindly, immediately on receipt of this, write to the office of the Anchor Line at New York to say that McInnes is coming to you as a Student and that he is not intending to settle permanently in the States nor likely to become a burden. The reason I ask this is that the Steamer people here anticipate trouble with the Customs officials in New York because he is D. & D., and they think that a line from you would facilitate matters there.

I enclose here with a Bank Draft for £40 to cover his fees for the first year, and any incidental expenses which may arise, and I shall be glad if you will give him the unused



Balance at your discretion. I am telling  
him to apply to you when he needs any  
thing.

I have succeeded in raising the £150  
which I calculated would, with care, give  
him a three years course with you, &  
I hope he will do well & be a credit both to  
us & you.

I am very vexed about the unfortunate  
delay in posting on the letter which I wrote you in  
June and which had got shoved under some papers  
in my office instead of going off as I expected. Please  
accept my apologies.

It is just possible I may be visiting  
Washington sometime during the winter. Some 500 British  
Teachers are to pay a visit to the States & I have  
applied to be one of them.

Dear Dr. Jallandet

Since writing you yesterday I have been to the U. S. Consulate here, to see if they can facilitate Mr Jones entry into the States - but they say they can do nothing, and that it rests entirely with the Emigration Authorities in New York, and they say here that if possible, someone should meet him <sup>at the Steamer to explain matters.</sup> Unfortunately I know nobody in New York - so I must leave it entirely to your goodness to do what you can to get Mr Jones through. I shall send him on by the Astoria, & take the risk of having him sent back, but I hope that extremity won't come. I am giving him a Certificate with him to say that he is coming as a Student & not intending to settle permanently <sup>if not</sup> likely to become a burden on the States.

I suppose you can't get President Roosevelt to intervene?!!


Dear Dr. Gallaudet:-

I have yours with reference to the bill still due on Henderson's account. About ten days ago I wrote Judge Pike explaining to him fully and stated to him how embarrassing it is to me to be placed in a situation where I have either to pay the amount myself or have the college people consider me very remiss in not making more certain arrangements. I have done all I really can toward that boy's expenses and while I do feel obligated to see that the amount is paid <sup>it</sup> seems now that there is little hope of any one else assisting in the matter. Had Henderson not written to Judge Pike as he did there would have been no trouble I think, but, of course, that is all done and cannot be helped now. I shall make one more effort, sending your letter to the Judge and in case nothing comes of it I shall try to see that the college loses nothing in the transaction.

The one redeeming feature about Mosey is that the boy has an infinite amount of curiosity and when interested is a worker. If he can only get with the right kind of boys there will be no trouble as to his conduct but I regret to say he is not very strong morally and needs advice and attention.

Dear Dr. Gallaudet

In accordance with your request, I beg leave to submit herewith my views in regard to basket ball.

For argument's sake let us suppose that the Faculty would be willing to allow basket ball to become a recognized college sport, like foot ball or base ball. The players would then want to practice at least four days in the week. To admit of this the game would have to be made a part of the regular gymnasium work; or the players be excused from the Gym. and permitted to practice in the evening from 9 to 10 o'clock.

In regard to the first proposition after a talk with Mr. Henry, I am satisfied that there are not over six students who can be called good players, and not over twelve in all who are really interested in the game. It would be unfair to the majority to make basket ball compulsory.

For years I have had three divisions as follows:

1 <sup>st</sup>	Div., Introductory Class,	exercising 3:40 - 4:10
2 <sup>nd</sup>	" Sophs. + Freshmen	" 4:15 - 4:45
3 <sup>rd</sup>	" Seniors + Juniors	" 4:45 - 5:15

Were it so arranged that only members of the teams should play basket ball, then it would be necessary to bring the 1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup> Divisions together. This would derange my system, which is progressive from year to year, and would demoralize the work. It is hard enough to get the Sophs and Freshmen to exercise together harmoniously; with the Ducks added there would be a circus.

Concerning the second proposition, while it would not interfere to any extent with the work to excuse four or five men from each division, I would not care to be responsible for their standing in the class room. I doubt if any of them would study during gym. hours, and besides there are very few men who can exercise violently between 9 and 10 P.M., and get to sleep inside of several hours.

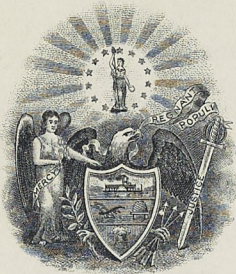
I am in hearty accord with your idea that there should be no college sports during the winter months to draw the students from their studies. As it is now, the boys have Wed. & Sat. for practice in basket ball. The players might be excused from the Gym. on Friday and allowed to play in the evening. This would give them three days in the week, and ought to be enough to enable them to become sufficiently proficient to play interesting games among themselves, and an occasional one with an outside team like that of the Y.M.C.A.
