Dear Sir:-

Dr. Black has enclosed your letter to him to me with a brief note of inquiry in respect to the cases of Long and Fagan. You will readily understand that it is impossible for the Governor of Delaware to grant warrants upon the State Treasurer thereof, without legal authority so to do. As I have written to Dr. Black, all admissions of the deaf, dumb, blind, &c. from this State into outside institutions are governed by statute. The statute in question provides that all such admissions shall be upon the recommendation of at least three Judges of the Superior Court to the Governor of the State, and his endorsement of the said recommendation.

I would also call your attention that the amount appropriated is restricted, and not an unlimited amount for the maintenance of these inmates; and very often those who have secured the recommendation of the Judges and the approval of the Governor are compelled to wait for admission into these various institutions.
