My dear sir:

On June 22 of this year my sister, Ethel Eaton, will graduate from the State School for the Deaf, at Clatse, Kansas, after having taken the entire course at that school, from the kindergarten up. She is now 16 years of age, and is an exceptionally bright child in her studies, but she has not received enough attention in oral work and lip-reading and I desire especially to know what advantages she would have at your school in these particular branches.

Please consider this an application for her enrolment for the term commencing next fall and I would thank you to write me fully as soon as possible in regard to what is necessary to be done in order that she may enter at the beginning of your next term, also giving cost of tuition and board per annum, if any, and any other incidental expense necessary to be incurred. I have heard from several sources that your school was supported by the national government and that there was no charge for tuition. Please advise. My sister has a very dear friend attending your school, now in her Freshman year, I believe, a Miss Alice Gregory, from Topeka, Kansas, and they are planning on rooming together. I would appreciate it very much if it could be arranged so that they might room together, as it would make it much more pleasant for my sister, and also, I think, for Miss Gregory.
