

Kansas School Honors Our Late Grand President, Arthur L. Roberts



New Arthur L. Roberts Academic Building at Kansas School for the Deaf

CTOBER 9, 1961 marked an event which although unheralded should be a date to go down in history for Fratdom, for on this date the newly completed Arthur L. Roberts Academic Building was formally opened for occupancy on the campus at the Kansas State School for the Deaf in Olathe, Kansas.

Dedication ceremonies have been set for December 9, 1961, at which a bronze plaque bearing a likeness of Brother Roberts will be presented the school by Olathe Division No. 14, Kansas City Division No. 31, Wichita Division No. 75, Kansas City Auxiliary Division No. 134, and the Kansas Association of the Deaf. The plaque will also contain suitable inscription describing the career of our late grand president.

The new academic building costing \$515,000.00 is indeed a fitting tribute to Brother Roberts who began his life of service to the deaf as a counselor at the Kansas School following his graduation from Gallaudet College in 1904. Brother Roberts was graduated from the Kansas School in 1899.

Of modern, fireproof construction throughout, the new building contains three floors and a basement. The first floor is occupied by offices, testing rooms, health room, barber shop, professional library and a large library and study hall. A large art room is also on the first floor.

The second and third floors are devoted entirely to classrooms, there being twenty-two classrooms in all. Several rooms have received special treatment to make them adaptable to the purposes for which they were intended. The advanced science room contains modern laboratory facilities with work tables for 16 students, each equipped with running water, gas and electricity. A lecture room adjoins the laboratory with students' chairs arranged on tiers to facilitate watching demonstrations by the instructor. An intermediate science room on a smaller scale is also provided.

All the rooms have buzzer and flashing light installations to signal time for

changing class and also for emergency warnings in case of fire, tornado or other emergency.

The basement is occupied by a large activity room which will be used for rhythm work, meetings and rehearsals, a completely equipped darkroom for the school's Photo Club, storage space for the various departments of the school and a large shelter area which can hold all the students in case of tornado or fall-out.

Stanley D. Roth is superintendent of the school. He is the son of deaf parents and his father was a member of the N.F.S.D. Many deaf members of the school faculty and staff are members of the Frat and the Auxiliary.

Olathe, Kansas should be on the itinerary of all vacationing members of the National Fraternal Society of the Deaf when their routes take them in that vicinity in order that they can visit this new school and see a lasting memorial to one of our greatest grand presidents.

Plans for the dedication on December 9, 1961 call for the presence of Governor Anderson of Kansas, and four former superintendents of the school who are now living, Dr. Elwood A. Stevenson, Dr. Daniel T. Cloud, Howard M. Quigley and Alfred Cranwill. The Home Office will be represented by Grand President L. S. Cherry, who will accompany Dr. Roberts' widow, Ida, to Olathe for the ceremonies.—Bro. Fred Murphy

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

Stowe, Vermont Workshop

HE University of Vermont, College of Medicine and the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation were joint sponsors of an Institute on the Rehabilitation of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing at Stowe, Vermont, September 18-20. This Institute was essentially a New England event and although there have been previous meetings of this type in the New England States in the past, this is the first in which any deaf participants have been included and to which any of our national organizations of the deaf have received invitations to send representatives. It was my privilege to represent the National Fraternal Society of the Deaf.

The Institute, attended by approximately 75 prominent doctors, educators,

rehabilitation persons and 5 deaf participants, including representatives of three national deaf organizations, read and discussed papers and problems directly relating to the deaf, deafness and the hard of hearing.

Dr. Boyce Williams' address on "Basic Needs of Deaf Persons with Impaired Hearing," a paper that is familiar to many deaf persons was the major rehabilitation address of the Institute and was enthusiastically received.

The coordinators had thoughtfully invited three interpreters from the American School at West Hartford and a rather amusing highlight of this was the admission of many of the speakers that sign language interpreting was a new experience for them.

The afternoon of the first day's meeting was given over to a panel discussion. Each representative of the national organizations for the deaf and for the hard of hearing gave a descriptive history of his organization. The N.F.S.D., the N.A.D. and the I.C.D.A. were represented by deaf persons and three organizations of the hard of hearing—the C.E.D., the A.H.S.A. and the A.H.S. were represented by hearing persons.

In a review of our Society we made every effort to give a clear and concise history of the N.F.S.D. from the beginning, 60 years ago. Since the majority of the participants were hearing persons they were greatly impressed with the accomplishments and the purposes of the N.F.S.D.

The major part of the three day meeting was given over to speakers who are highly experienced in their respective field of medical research on deafness, education, and rehabilitation of the deaf. There were, however, two discussion group meetings with participants divided into 6 discussion groups. A wide range of subjects pertaining to the deaf and hard of hearing were discussed and the results were, as intended, enlightenment, and stimulation to further action and thought.

Dr. Leonard M. Elstad, principal speaker at the banquet, spoke of the advanced educational methods of instructing deaf children—from the pri-mary grades through college, and gave a remarkable demonstration of the simultaneous method of instruction in use at Gallaudet College.

The Planning Committee and Dr. M. Alfred Haynes of the University of Vermont, coordinator of the Institute, are to be commended for their wellorganized program.

It is an undoubted truth that the less one has to do the less time one finds to do it in. One yawns, one procrastinates, one can do it when one will, and, therefore, one seldom does it at all; whereas, those who have a great deal of business must (to use a vulgar expression) buckle to it; and then they always find time enough to do it in.

THE NATIONAL FRATERNAL SOCIETY OF THE DEAF is a fraternal life insurance association of deaf men and and women. It is organized on the lodge system and has branch lodges, called Divisions, in over a hundred principal cities of the United States and

Objects

The society's objects are: To pay death benefits to the families of members who die; to pay benefits to male members who fall sick or meet accidental injury; to unite all deaf men and women of good health, habits and character in a circle of friendliness and good fellowship for the purpose of helping one another and making life better and happier for all of its members and the deaf as a class.

Death, Sick and Accident Benefits

The society guarantees to pay the beneficiary of a deceased member the amount for which the certificate is written, subject to the requirements and restrictions set

forth in the society's laws.

To a male member disabled by sickness or accident for seven days or longer the society will pay a benefit ranging from \$10.00 to \$40.00 per week, depending on the amount of weekly benefit chosen by the member and for which the required tax is paid. No benefit, however, is paid for less than 7 days duration; nor can any member draw more than 10 weeks' disability benefit within any twelve consecutive months. For women, accident benefits only are available. Benefits range from \$5.00 to \$25.00 per week, under the same conditions as prevail for male members.

Safeguards

The Society is chartered under the laws of the state of Illinois and is licensed by the insurance departments of thirty-seven other states, and by the Dominion of Canada. An annual report of the society's business for the year and financial condition is made to all these state insurance departments. From time to time, examiners from the Society's home state and from other states make an examination and verify returns made in the annual report.

A voucher system is in use at the home office and every expenditure must have the approval of the Grand President. The Grand Treasurer and treasurers of all the Divisions are bonded. The Board of Trustees makes a

monthly audit of the Grand Treasurer's books.

Cost of Joining

The entrance fee is \$3.00 and is always to be paid with the application. In case of rejection the \$3.00 will be refunded. The applicant has also to pay the doctor's fee, if medical examination is necessary.

How to Join

Write to the nearest secretary and ask for an application blank and any further information you may desire. If you live in a city where there is a Division, see any member or officer of that Division.

If you live very far from any city which has a Division, or in a state in which no Division has yet been organized, write to the Home Office for application blank or information.

If you do not live in or near a Division city you will be attached to some Division as a non-resident member.

In writing for blanks or information be sure and give full name, age, occupation and address.
