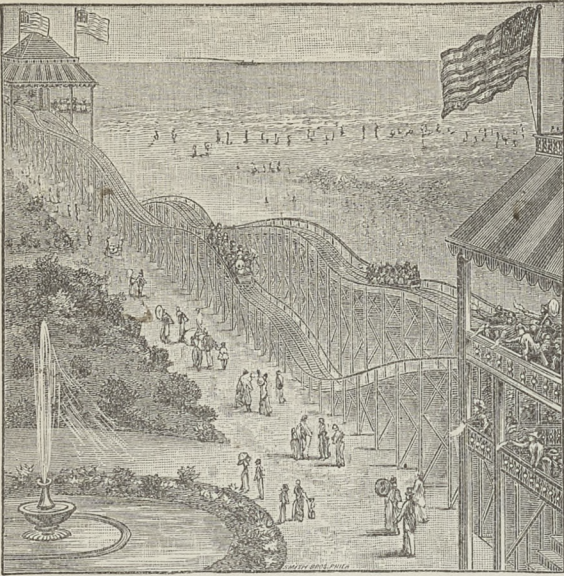

Switch-Back Railway Coasting Track at River View.

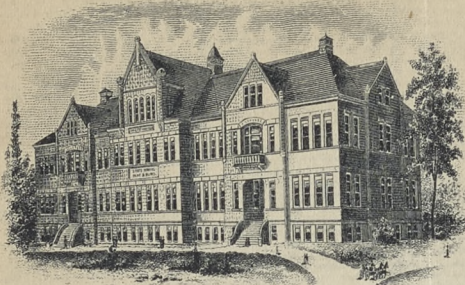

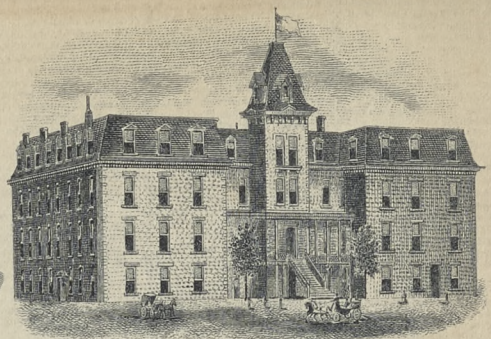


Was there a graduate (full) from your Inst. at the last Commencement, whom you can fully recommend, in every particular, for the position of teacher, and who can be had?

Dear Sir:-

In a paper presented by me on the Sign Language at our Teachers' Association, I made the suggestion that as the attempt to establish anything like a Normal School to prepare teachers for the deaf, had failed, it might still be accomplished by opening some such department in connection with the College.

The suggestion came to me last summer &

it appeared to me not
out of place to speak
to you of it.

It has just come
to my knowledge that
a certain Congressman
had suggested the founding
of a great university at
Washington in which
young men & women ~~would~~
might fit themselves, free
of charge, to become in-
structors in the speaking
schools of the country.

Now in this great work
of educating the deaf
it would appear that
those engaged in it should
be all the more prepared,
since it is a peculiarly
difficult work, especially
to those who can hear.
