My Sisters
daughter Mary H. Burns
would like to attend Gall-
audet College this year.

She Graduated at the Oral
School, at Scranton last yr.
Also at the Mt. Airy, school
Phila, Pa., this yr. She is
a member of the Baptist
Church, being a good, kind
honest, deaf young woman.
Her character is above re-
proach. She wants to be ed-
ucated, to become a self
supporting woman. Her Mother
being left a widow twice, can
not afford to educate her.
She lost considerable money

after her husband's death by different investments. Mr. Deemer our Ex-Congressman had my Father to have a business man of our city, write him a letter. And he also promised to write a letter to the Congressman, so these letters could be sent to you. It being 3 or 4 weeks now and we rec'd no reply yet. Mary's Aunt in the West, and other relatives of hers, are willing to buy her clothing, but they can not afford to pay her way through school. She would like to be admitted by a Government certificate. Or I mean by the money appropriated by the Government to educate the

Deaf people, She makes her home with us since her Fathers death. Please kindly let me hear from you in regard to this matter.
