to notify him of the place.

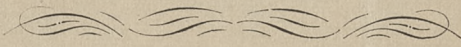

I have addressed the following note to the V. Pres. of the Lena Cotta Co. which is in answer to various correspondence sent me by that Co. which I find on my return.

V. P. Lena Cotta Co. Dear Sir. On my return I find a number of papers relating to the two vases you kindly sent me, In your letter to the Superintendent of the Deaf & Dumb Asylum, concerning these vases, you state that I was to see him in regard to them. This is incorrect. Your Clerk simply informed me that the Co. was prevented selling vases of the kind but he thought the imperfect pair might be sent up, After considerable delay, caused as I understood by the necessity to make new base portions, the vases were sent to my house. I only accepted them in that way because by your agreement they could not be kept for sale. I did not dream of an objection by Mr. Gallaudet. There was no violation of your contract as I understand it. I will return the vases with much pleasure and will furnish you with patterns for a vase which will suit me quite as well and which

you

may seem.

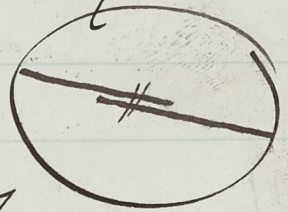

diameter of boiler. He can easily do
this by using two slicks thus
spreading them out inside of
the Boiler. The grate being
