

Dear Dr. Gallaudet:--

If there should occur a vacancy in the faculty or a position become open at the college which I could fill, I beg you will consider me as an applicant for the place.

I believe you are more or less familiar with my work since I left college and will be able to judge of my qualifications. You will remember that I taught in the advanced department of the Wisconsin school for twelve years, being in charge of the graduating class and later, when the rotation system was adopted, instructor in language, grammar and literature.

I was appointed to a similar position in this school and since 1903 have been head teacher of the academic department, also acting principal of the school. Until last year I taught the same branches that I did in Wisconsin but am now teaching History and Science.

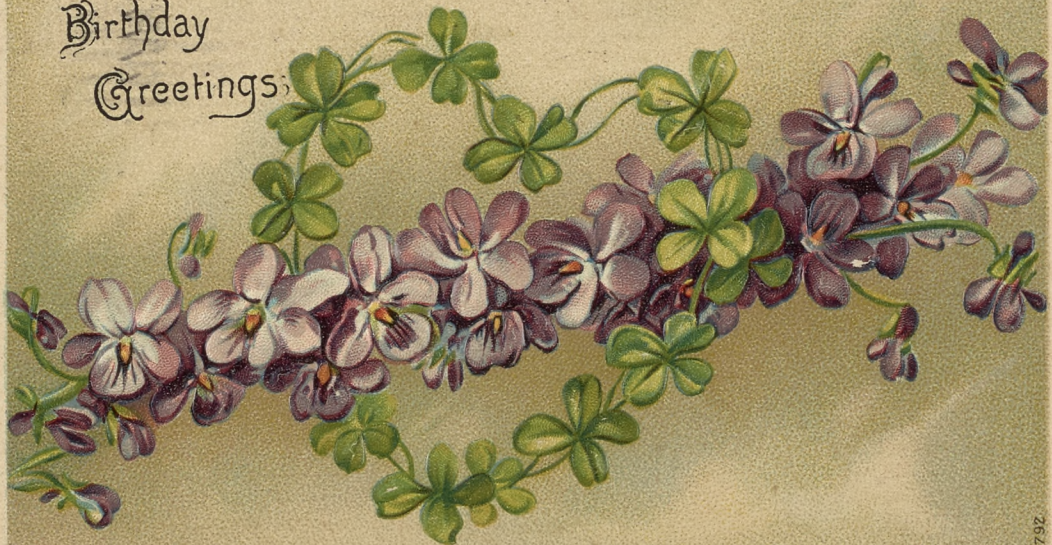


