College to offer MS in Ed Tech

The Gallaudet College School of Education and Human Services and the Graduate School have announced the establishment of a Master of Science degree program in Education Technology: Special Education/Deafness.

The new program, which was approved by the Gallaudet College Board of Trustees on March 19, will begin accepting students in the spring of the 1981-82 academic year.

According to Ronald Nomeland, department chairman, the program will respond to the need for trained resource personnel who possess the skills needed to work with special student populations in various educational settings. Furthermore, the program will provide additional career opportunities for Gallaudet students and for teachers who wish to pursue further studies, or who wish to integrate and apply educational technology concepts to instructional situations and teaching.

The new program is unique in that it combines educational technology skills with knowledge of special education and deafness. Graduates of the program who possess this combination of skills and knowledge will be qualified to work in three basic areas: Instructional Design, Media Management and Media Product Development. Specifically, graduates might work as graphics specialists, instructional designers, librarians, library/media specialists, media specialists or television production specialists. Graduates could apply their skills in programs that serve the deaf and other handicapped learners, or in regular educational settings.

The program faculty is made up of both deaf and hearing educational technologists who are members of the Department of Educational Technology and the Department of Library and Information Studies.

The program includes academic coursework and supervised practicum experiences in educational settings on and off campus. The training program also provides for individual learning contracts, laboratory experiences and seminars.

A full-time student can complete the program in three semesters, starting in the spring semester and finishing at the end of the following spring semester.

The Graduate School will be accepting a limited number of candidates for the 1981-82 school year. The deadline for applications, for the 1981-82 academic year only, is May 15, 1981. Applications for part-time (special student) status can be made 60 days prior to the beginning of each semester.

Database information

Recently there must have been a database explosion! It seems that every month either BRS or Lockheed Dialog (the two major database vending services) announces at least one new database added to their listings. This increases the subject areas that can be searched via computer and often makes research easier and/or more feasible.

Before you decide that a topic is completely impossible, come and investigate how a computer search might help. The topic indeed may be completely impossible, but you might be pleasantly surprised. Fantastic results can't be guaranteed every time, but give it a try before counting an idea off completely.

New available databases are:

- Dow Jones News—business and financial news from *Wall Street Journal*, *Barron's* and Dow Jones News Wire Services.
- Patsearch—more than 700,000 U.S. patents issued since 1971.
- Science Citation Index—companion file to Social Science Citation Index; along with the usual bibliographic data, offers list of cited references used in each item.
- Health Planning Administration—health management, public health, hospital finance and related topics.
- State Publications—from the 50 states, the Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico, from 1976 to date.
- Georef—database of the American Geological Institute; includes economic geology, geochemistry, seismology and marine hydrology.

Regional education

The Office of Special Education within the Department of Education has announced April 17, 1981 as the re-

vised deadline date for "Regional Education Programs for Deaf and Other Handicapped Students." The objective of the solicitation is to develop and operate programs of vocational, technical, postsecondary or adult education for deaf or other handicapped persons.

This program was originally announced in the Oct. 7, 1980 *Federal Register*. According to OSE, since "the total amount of funds available was not assured, application packets were withheld from mailing." It is now believed that approximately \$1.6 million will be available for new demonstration projects in FY '81.

Health Ed RPF cancelled

Gallaudet College received notification from the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, GA that the RPF for a "Comprehensive Health Education Program for Parents of Deaf Children" was cancelled. CDC gave the reason as a "recent rescission of FY 1981 funds." The project opportunity appeared in the March 9, 1981 issue of OTG. Coordinating the proposal development effort was Max Fitz-Gerald of MSSD. The primary purpose of the proposed project was to support parents of deaf children in their role as health educators. CDC has indicated that this program opportunity may be reissued next year depending upon the availability of funds.

President's Office Notes

Goya discussed at Dinner-Lecture

Forty-one Gallaudet faculty and staff members left their cares behind on the evening of March 26 and traveled with Chrysler Museum Director David W. Steadman into the weird and wonderful world of "Goya."

Steadman spoke at the President's Dinner-Lecture about the work of Francisco Jose de Goya y Lucientes (1746-1828), Spanish artist, etcher and designer. He discussed the influence of Spanish history, poverty, famine, religion, war and the inquisition on Goya's work.

Goya is popularly known through his numerous etchings, descriptive and satirical. His work was widely reproduced, depicting insurrection, street fights, folk pictures and bullfighting. His *Los Proverbios* (Proverbs) and *Los Caprichos* (Caprices) are wild, weird and sometimes grotesque caricatures of society and religion with hidden meaning brought to the audience with humor by Steadman.

On display were seven Goyas, three recently purchased by Gallaudet and four on loan. Steadman assured the audience that ours are the first editions—authentic Goya prints. Later ones, he explained, would be "worked over" by artisans to restore the depth of the cuts needed to produce a distinct image. He suggested that the College purchase one of these less valuable later editions for comparison. The Goyas will be housed at MSSD.

Steadman, who received MAT, MA and PhD degrees from Harvard, the University of California and Princeton University respectively, has assisted Gallaudet for several years in its effort to bring important art to the campus. He has advised the College in the purchase of the Matisse prints which are hanging at MSSD. He also served on a panel which selected Clement Meadmore for the KDES sculpture commission.

Dear Editor:

I am a deaf mother of a deaf child who is attending the pre-school program at Kendall Demonstration Elementary School. The other day, I read an article, "Kendall Pre-School: a learning base to build from" in *On the Green*, March 16, 1981 and I want to make some comments on the statements quoted by Ms. Janice Welborn, preschool program supervisor.

There are some vital factors that have been left out and I feel that they should be mentioned.

In the article, nothing was mentioned about children who come from deaf families with a rich language environment: a sign language environment. The children themselves have had a language of their own long before they began attending KDES. The article encourages the readers to think that the children came to school without any language. I object very strongly. Ms. Welborn failed to recognize that deaf children of deaf parents have already developed a complete language during those critical years. The language is Sign Language.

The word "language" appeared eight times and sign language showed up only once. It bothers me greatly as the word "language" is often used by educators of deaf children to mean English language. This misconception, that language = English, often influences people to think of language development in English only and they fail to see the possibility that the deaf children can learn to use both languages.

Ms. Welborn, like other educators, needs to remember that without children of deaf parents, the other children will be deprived of communicative enrichment, provided by their peers who are fluent in Sign Language.

I hope this will help people to think carefully and not to forget contributions made by deaf parents and deaf people to the education of deaf children.
