Dear Sir:

I this morning received your favor of yesterday, in reply to my letter to you of the 1st instant, on the subject of your private line. You state that it is a great surprise to you to learn that the efficient working of your telephone system can only be secured by doubling the charge of \$60.- per annum. This is not the case, and I hope that you will be good enough not to present this view of the matter to your Board of Directors. My view of the case is that you are entitled to good and efficient service regardless of the rate you pay and the \$120.- rate mentioned by me as the one at

which your service will be taken here
after was not named by me as necessary
to give you good service, but as the
rate that I have been instructed to
charge for all private-line service,
wherever located, in the District of
Columbia or the State of Maryland.

Please accept my thanks for
your promised action, in ^{relation to} submitting
my letter to your Board of Directors,
and permit me to ask that you
kindly submit this explanation at
the same time.

Dear Sir:

Referring to your communication of the 15th instanc, and my reply thereto of the 17th, in relation to the telephone service at your institution, I have now to state that I have investigated the question of your private line service, of which you make complaints, and find that you are paying us \$60.50 per annum for a service we are not now permitted to offer for less than \$120.50 per annum, or \$30.50 per annum per station, equipped with telephone instrument. You are entitled to and should receive a good and efficient service at all times, and every instrument in use by you, and the line with which they are connected, should be maintained in proper

condition, and I should be glad to give orders that proper measures be adopted to secure this to you. I must, however, require payment from your institution at the regular established rate, viz. \$30.00 per annum per station.

This does not seem to agree with the view expressed in your letter of the 15th instanc, I regret to say; but it is the only rate I have any authority to offer. This would give you perfect working instruments, (hand telephone & transmitters) and would secure you first class service in all respects.
