He scored 6 times and made 3 extra points for 39 tallies to lead all of the team's scorers. He gained a total of 1,978 yards in 105 carries, an average of 18 yards per! KSD went through the season with only 3 wins in their 8 game schedule. . . Powell, the Michigan school speedster, made a record 17 touchdowns. A newcomer worth watching in MSD's future is Don Smolinski. His brother Mark plays for the N.Y. Jets of the American Football League. Last year, Michigan was the only other school to go undefeated (8-0). This season, they finished with 6 wins, 2 losses, and good for third in the Motor Valley conference (W-3, L-2), losing to Champ Morrice, 6-0, and to 2nd place Birch Run, 20-13! . . EXT to television a greater boon is in store for the deaf! How would you like to be able to communicate with your relatives and friends over the telephone WITHOUT the aid of hearing persons? It IS possible for there are presently THREE different instruments for such purposes being tested in the homes of several New York area deaf. They are (1) a system whereby the caller makes clicking sounds on the phone which is easily felt and picked up by the receiver and translated; (2) a device similar to that used by the newspaper and wire services which retypes messages typed out by the sender; and (3) an instrument that ACTUALLY WRITES OUT MES-SAGES sent by the caller who uses a special "pencil" to send his words.

These tests are directed by Dr. Edna S. Levine, in charge of a committee making a study on the practicability of the machines for the deaf. She hopes to eventually come across an even better communication aid by using the above tests as a springboard to greater possibilities.

The third instrument described previously is called an *electro-writer* and is presently being experimented by two of our Brothers of Manhattan Division No. 87, Max Friedman and Richard Myers. The lucky "pioneers" have conversed over the phone and found it very useful. They, however, bewail the fact that their homes are becoming public "show-places". Since you are doing your work in the cause of the deaf, stay on the trail, pioneers!

# Research on Deaf Expanding

THOSE concerned with the education of the deaf will be watching with much interest two research programs now under way or scheduled for this year and supported by grants from the U.S. Vocational Rehabilitation Administration and the U.S. Office of Education.

One study presently being conducted by the University of Pittsburgh is concentrated on "the possible influence of sign language, when acquired by the very young deaf child, on speech, speechreading, written language, reading and psychosocial development." To this end, the researchers have selected 100 deaf children of deaf parents and 100 deaf children of hearing parents in five schools for the deaf, and presumably will base their conclusions on the comparative results shown from the study of this group.

Another program, actually one part of a three-area research, will begin in the fall at the University of Illinois' Institute for Research on Exceptional Children. This will involve "the problems and development of the language and communication skills of deaf persons." Matched groups of children in three residential schools for the deaf which use finger-spelling as an instructional method and six residential schools which do not will be tested over a three-year period. In addition, one other residential school will have two classes of beginning children subjected to an experimental study. Both will have an identical curriculum, but one class will include the use of fingerspelling along with speech, speech-reading and flash cards. The objective of this program will be to "determine if the systematic use of finger spelling in classroom instruction contributes to

the language development of deaf children."

The results of these two programs may have far-reaching effect on the education of the deaf in this country, but that will depend largely on how convincingly the researchers present the figures they obtain from their studies. If the results are not favorable to those of a certain persuasion, claim will be made that not all factors were considered by the researchers, so we trust that the factors which really count, including the human factor, will be taken under consideration.

We are sure that the deaf of this country will welcome the report of the findings. Not that we are awaiting it with a smug look. Rather, it will be with a hopeful one, for thereby may lie our opportunity to back up our convictions about the combined system of instruction with some solid facts. All too often, parents of deaf children are left with the impression that their children go to school to learn to talk, instead of to think. And all too often, years later, they find that their sacrifice of education for speech and speech reading was of little avail. Parents must be urged to demand that, if results of the studies warrant it, all schools should use the method which will produce the optimum in the education of their deaf children.

# Juvenile Members

BY action of our Convention in Memphis last summer, deaf children under the age of 18 may be admitted to juvenile membership, with life insurance, under procedure determined by the Grand Division Board of Directors. The necessary preparations are about completed, and application forms and rates pertaining to this juvenile membership will soon be ready for distribution.

The applicant shall be the person (parent or guardian) who wishes to insure the life of a deaf child, and shall have possession of the insurance certificate until the child reaches age 18 and applies for adult membership.

If the amount of insurance desired is \$3,000 or less, a medical examination of the child may be waived. However, in such case, the Home Office has the right to have its representative make a cursory inspection of the youngster.

While the members in the juvenile group will not belong to any particular division, it is contemplated at present to assign them to divisions nearest their homes for the purpose of dues collection. The Home Office will reimburse the divisions for expenses in connection with this service.

All applications for juvenile insurance shall be sent direct to the Home Office, as no division action is necessary. A deposit of \$3.00 must accompany the application. This deposit will be applied to the initial premium, and will be returned in the event the application is rejected.

# 1967 Convention

The Grand Division Executive Board has voted to hold the Convention during the week of July 17-22, 1967. The Board also has approved the selection of the New York Statler Hilton Hotel, situated in mid-Manhattan, as head-quarters for this national meeting.

Interesting developments in the arrangements will be announced from time to time.

# Interpreters Workshop

A WORKSHOP on Interpreting for the Deaf will be held June 15-17, 1964, at Ball State Teachers College, Muncie, Ind. Dr. William J. Mc-Clure, superintendent of the Indiana School for the Deaf, is project director. The Workshop is being made possible under a grant from the Vocational Rehabilitation Administration.

The Workshop is expected to provide guidelines on many aspects of interpreting, including recommendations for national standards for "qualified" interpreters. While many states have laws providing for interpreters in certain types of court cases involving the deaf, the Federal courts do not. There are countless other occasions when competent interpreters are needed.

The planning committee for the Workshop includes five deaf persons: Dr. Boyce R. Williams, office of Vocational Rehabilitation Administrator; Mrs. Loel J. Francis, Culver City, Calif.; Don G. Pettingill, Indianapolis, Ind.; Jess M. Smith, also of Indianapolis; and Frank B. Sullivan, NFSD Grand Secretary-Treasurer. Other members: Dr. Edmund B. Boatner, Louie Fant, Lloyd A. Harrison, Dr. Steven P. Quigley, Dr. Ralph Hoag, Dr. Stanley D. Roth, Edward L. Scouten, Dr. Edward L. Tillinghast, and Dr. Frank Withrow.

Participants at the Workshop will include representatives of various national organizations, religious groups, vocational rehabilitation workers, and members of the planning committee. Total attendance is expected to be between 75 and 80, of whom roughly onethird will be deaf.


