GALLAUDET GRADUATES 191

One hundred ninety-one graduate and undergraduate students from 34 states, the District of Columbia, and six foreign countries received their degrees at the 108th commencement on Monday.

Held in the National Cathedral, which dates from 1893 and is yet unfinished, the commencement exercises began with an academic procession at 10:30 a.m.

Following the invocation by the Reverend Steve L. Mathis and the national anthem sung by Mrs. Celina Cornett and signed by George Pehlgrim, Senator Warren G. Magnuson delivered the commencement address.

Charging the students with the responsibility of making the world more humane, the Senator from Washington cautioned, "Whatever your role in helping meet the challenges of our time, you must expect to come up against bigotry, conformity, and fear.

"I'm sure that you've already faced them -- in your personal lives and at a very early age. But you've all persevered. And in doing so you won over some of those who had doubts and fears and reservations about deaf people."

He concluded: "The deaf can't be content to be told what they should do and how they should do it by their hearing brethren. The deaf must not only ask but demand a voice in the private and public agencies concerned with deaf people."

Following tradition, degrees were presented to the graduates, whenever possible, by their congressmen, ambassadors, or embassy representatives.

In addition, four honorary degrees were presented to Senator Warren Magnuson,

Mrs. Nanette Fabray MacDougall, Mr. Malcolm J. Norwood, and Dr. Kenneth Z. Altshuler.

Also attending the commencement was Dr. and Mrs. Wesley Lauritsen from Minnesota. "Wes" graduated from Gallaudet 50 years ago.
