DONATIONS DESIGNATED FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

The many donations which have been made in memory of Dr. Elizabeth Benson will be used to provide scholarships at the College.

"Benny," who was a faculty member and dean of women at Gallaudet for 44 years, died December 13, 1972, in Frederick, Maryland, after a long illness.

Recognized as a master of all types of communications used by the deaf, Miss Benson had been traveling throughout the country to interpret for deaf groups since her retirement from Gallaudet in 1970. At the time of her death, she was interpreter for the Gallaudet College Board of Directors.

WASHINGTON AT LARGE

--A selection of 76 photographs from the Look magazine collection has been put on display as part of the "Recent

Major Photographic Acquisitions" show at the Library of Congress. The photographs include both black and white and color prints taken from the magazine during its 35-year history by some of the world's leading photojournalists. --A French theatre workshop has been organized at Howard University. During this month the group will begin preparations for two new productions to be presented this spring. It is hoped that the project will be extended from the classroom to a community theatre. --A calendar of the events to be presented at the Kennedy Center from now until May is posted on the bulletin board across the hall from the Visitors Center in Chapel Hall. Those programs which are offered at discounted prices are indicated.

AROUND THE GREEN

--On December 11, six doctoral students and three staff members from the Educational Technology for Educators of the Deaf program at Syracuse University were on campus as part of a three-day field trip to Washington. --A two-day meeting of the ad hoc committee on postsecondary education of the Conference of Executives of American Schools for the Deaf will take place at Gallaudet January 4-5. The committee, which was organized as a result of a resolution passed by CEASD in Toronto this spring, is to define "principles which will assist postsecondary institutions on assuring that the education and training of deaf students accepted into their respective settings is one of quality." Gil Delgado was selected task chairman of the committee and Dr. E. Ross Stuckless from the National Technical Institute is co-chairman.

--Two large boxes of clothing and food plus \$36 in cash were collected by the D.C. Chapter of the Gallaudet College Alumni Association at their Christmas party on December 13. The gifts were presented to the families of two Kendall school children.

BALTIMORE ADOPTS SIGN LANGUAGE PROGRAM

Bill No. 542 was introduced and passed by the City Council of Baltimore which requested:

"...the Board of School Commissioners of Baltimore City and the State of Maryland Board of Education to establish a 'Language of Signs' for the deaf program for students with normal hearing as an elective in the secondary and adult education language curriculum."

The bill is in recognition of the estimated 4,700 deaf persons living in Baltimore and the estimated 21,000 in the state of Maryland. It is hoped that action taken as a result of the legislation will improve communication between the hearing and deaf communities. The Baltimore-Washington area has the second largest deaf population in the nation.

COSD ANNOUNCES FORUM

All those persons who are interested in deaf children are invited to attend the 6th Annual Forum of the Council of Organizations Serving the Deaf which will be held on May 14-16 in Williamsburg, Virginia. Registration for this year's forum, "The Deaf Child and His Family," will begin on Tuesday afternoon, May 13.

Since a number of people were unable to be accommodated at the 1972 forum, you are urged to pre-register.

If you register before February 15 the fee is \$15 per person and \$25 per family. After February 15 the fee will increase to \$20 per person and \$35 per family. Students under 12 will be able to attend free of charge. All other students will pay \$10.
