NEW HORIZONS AND CHALLENGES FOR THE DEAF

Judge Sherman G. Finesilver of the United States District Court of Colorado will discuss "New Horizons and Challenges for the Deaf -- A Blueprint for Action" at the Gallaudet Auditorium on January 29 at 7:30 p.m.

A noted expert in the area of safety and accident prevention, Judge Finesilver has attained national prominence for his pioneering leadership and efforts in meeting the driving and safety needs of the deaf, the physically impaired and the aging.

Judge Finesilver has been the recipient of numerous awards and honors including an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Gallaudet College (1970) for his "continuing interest in protecting the legal rights of the deaf."

Sponsored by the Cultural Affairs Committee, Judge Finesilver's appearance is open to the public free of charge.

FORUM TO EXPLORE CURRENT PUBLIC ISSUES

The Gallaudet Forum, a series of dinner-lectures designed to explore current and significant issues, will be offered for the first time by the Gallaudet College Center for Continuing Education.

The theme of "accountability" will underscore the talks. Scheduled speakers are: Joseph Danzansky, president of Giant Foods; Katharine Graham, president and owner of the Washington Post Company; George Allen, coach and general manager of the Washington Redskins; and a member of the United States Congress to be announced at a later date.

The lectures, 45 minutes to an hour in length, will begin at 6 p.m. and will be followed by dinner and a question and answer period.

The fee for the entire series, including dinner, is \$12. Registration will close on January 26.

SWITZER BUILDING DEDICATED

The Mary E. Switzer Memorial Building was dedicated Tuesday by the Secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Located at 330 C Street, S.W., the HEW building is one of the few Federal buildings to be named for an individual.

Ms. Switzer, who had been in Federal service for 48 years, was a member of the Board of Directors of Gallaudet College and vice president of the World Rehabilitation Fund at the time of her death.

"ANTIGONE" TO COMPETE IN THEATER FESTIVAL

The Gallaudet College Theatre has been invited to participate in the fifth annual Regional Festival of the American College Theater Festival. Gallaudet is scheduled to present "Antigone" on Sunday, January 28 at 7 p.m. at Prince George's Community College in Largo, Maryland.
