MODEL OF GALLAUDET STATUE ARRIVES

A bronze casting of the original plaster model used by Daniel Chester French to design the statue of Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet and Alice Cogswell arrived on campus this Tuesday. The 27 inch bronze statue will officially be presented to the College by Kelly Stevens on Charter Day, April 7.

In 1965, Mr. Stevens learned that the original plaster model was still stored in the attic of the American School for the Deaf in Hartford. Prior to his discovery, Mr. Stevens had been consulted by a group of deaf women in Texas who had raised funds for a casting of the statue to be presented to the Texas School for the Deaf.

Mr. Stevens repaired and restored the French model and sent it to Italy to be cast for the Texas School. He also had a second casting made for himself and now a third one for Gallaudet College.

To be permanently kept in the lobby of Hall Memorial Building, the statue stands on a 2000 pound base cut from Texas granite. The base has been purchased by the Laurent Clerc Cultural Fund of the Gallaudet College Alumni Association.
