Bloch to become executive director of NAD July 20

Nancy Bloch, director of Gallaudet's Management Institute, has been appointed as the first female executive director of the National Association of the Deaf (NAD), Dr. Roslyn Rosen, president of the NAD and dean of Gallaudet's College for Continuing Education, has announced.

Bloch will be leaving the University to accept the executive directorship with the NAD effective July 20.

In her new position, Bloch will be responsible for the overall leadership and management of the NAD, the nation's oldest consumer advocacy organization.

"My years at Gallaudet and numerous outside endeavors have prepared me to take on the challenge of guiding the NAD into the 21st century in the midst of rapid societal and technological changes," Bloch said.

As the first director of the Management Institute, a post she has held since 1988, Bloch instituted programs promoting career advancement, management, and entrepreneurial opportunities for deaf and hard of hearing business professionals.

She was a counselor at the Model Secondary School for the Deaf from 1978-80. From 1980-82 she worked as a guidance counselor at the California School for the Deaf in Fremont. In 1982 she returned to MSSD to work in career development.

Bloch later became a career counselor in the Counseling and Placement Center and a placement counselor in the Career Center, which she helped establish. She was coordinator of the National Academy's Professional and Community Training Program from 1987 to 1988.

College Hall to be re-dedicated this Friday The completion of the College Hall senior project manager, and Steve There will also be a reception in

The completion of the College Hall restoration project is such a cause for celebration that people who attend a July 17 ribbon-cutting ceremony to re-dedicate the building shouldn't be surprised if they see Edward Miner Gallaudet himself in attendance.

President I. King Jordan has invited the entire University community—which is enhanced this week by alumni who are at Kendall Green for the Gallaudet University Alumni Association's (GUAA) 34th Triennial Reunion—to the 1:30 p.m. ceremony in front of the main entrance to College Hall.

After more than a year of intensive construction, the inside and outside of College Hall appears much the same as it did to the people who came to the original dedication on Feb. 16, 1878: The third-floor Lyceum has been resurrected—complete with oak ceiling and stained glass window, the buff and blue tiles have been replaced in all the hallways, and once-hidden floor-to-ceiling columns on the second floor have been reexposed.

The re-dedication of College Hall will be formally marked by a ribbon-cutting performed by Dr. Jordan and Dr. David Peikoff, age 92, the oldest living alumnus in attendance at the Triennial Reunion.

Afterward, according to Gerri Frank, administrative assistant in the Advocacy Office, none other than E.M.G. is expected to make a cameo appearance, inviting everyone to come inside College Hall for a selfguided tour—and perhaps to make a point of seeing his desk, which will remain in the President's Office on the second floor.

Does the visage of the University's founder and first president, who died 75 years ago, prove that, indeed, spirits lurk in College Hall? "In that building, you never know," Frank said enigmatically.

Also at the ceremony, four people will tell about the role of College Hall and the restoration process from various points of view. Gallaudet Archivist Ulf Hedberg will present a historical perspective; Dr. Gerald "Bummy" Burstein, outgoing pre Burstein, outgoing president of the GUAA and a resident of the building when it served as a dormitory, will give an alumni's perspective; Kayt Lewis, coordinator of employee development and relations, will present a staff member's perspective; and Charles Mann, director of Business Services and the University's overseer for the project, will tell anecdotes about the renovation.

Jordan will recognize several key figures in the project: from Donohoe Construction Company, Mark Billings, senior project manager, and Steve Wice, project superintendent; from Einhorn, Yaffe, and Prescott, architect David Oboler; and from the University, Paul Kelly, vice president for Administration and Business, Mann, John Dunn, project supervisor, and Daniel Kirby, manager of Construction Services.

Everyone who attends the ceremony will be given a bookmark and a printed history of College Hall.

There will also be a reception in the Lyceum, complete with beverages that may have been served at the first dedication. Frank said that research in the University Archives revealed that the typical beverages served at events in the late 1800s were lemonade and iced tea with lemon. Homemade root beer was popular, too, but since we live in the age of pre-packaging, Frank said people will have to settle for the store-bought variety.

TV Department wins two Emmys, special Board of Governors Award

The University's Television Department, a unit within the Department of TV, Film, and Photography, was presented with the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences (NATAS) special Board of Governors Award and two Emmy Awards June 27 at the academy's 34th annual ceremony. Held at the National Museum of Natural History's Baird Auditorium, the event honored the achievements of Washington, D.C., area broadcasters during the past year.

Gallaudet President I. King Jordan and Ronald Reed, director of Television Production for the Department of TV, Film, and Photography, accepted the Board of Governors Award. The award is given by NATAS to an individual or organization for outstanding achievement in the arts, sciences, or television that is unique in its field.

The Television Department won an Emmy in the Regular Public Affairs, Location category for "Deaf Mosaic" #701, "XII World Games for the Deaf." John Mullen, director/editor of

Deaf Mosaic, accepted the award on behalf of producer Sandy White, who was unable to attend the ceremony.

The second Emmy was awarded in the Set Design category for Deaf Mosaic's new set.

Earlier in June, NATAS named the Television Department as one of four nominees for the Board of Governors Award, and nominated it for Emmy awards in six categories.

The other nominees for the Board of Governors Award were Brian Lamb, founder and chief executive officer of C-SPAN network; Bob Dalton, news anchor and 41-year veteran for WUSA-TV; and Jane Cohen, creator of the magazine and WJLA-TV program "Working Woman."

The other four Emmy nominations for the Television Department were Deaf Mosaic #610, "Costa Rica"; the "FANTASTIC 'G" children's program; and Deaf Mosaic composites in the categories of Audio, Studio/Remote and Editing, Magazine Program.

Deaf Mosaic has won a total of 12 Emmys since it began in 1984.

Date rape PSA wins first place

A 30-second public service announcement on date rape produced by Gallaudet's Student Health Services (SHS) was awarded first place from among 187 entries from 17 countries in an international television advertising competition.

Gallaudet's entry, which was in the safety/first aid category, garnered the Questar Award, given annually by the Museum of Broadcasting, representing the international broadcasting arts in television.

The announcement, written and produced by SHS Coordinating Nurse Jane Binzen and Health Educator Jennifer Morrone and starring Gallaudet student Poorna Rajagopalan, urges victims of date rape to report the crime.

Cinema Sound, a company hired by SHS to film the announcement, entered it in the contest and subsequently received the award. SHS, however, will receive a certificate giving it credit for its role in the winning announcement.

The video of the announcement is being shown on University cable TV. Binzen said she hopes to extend the broadcast of the announcement to the general public.
