THE LAW AND THE HANDICAPPED

The National Center for Law and the Handicapped, which was established in South Bend, Indiana, by a grant from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, is to provide legal assistance to individuals, consumer groups, and attorneys by:

--participating in litigation as counsel, co-counsel, or filing amicus briefs in cases involving handicapped persons --providing legal technical assistance to attorneys working in the field --conducting research on selected legal issues affecting the handicapped --reviewing proposed legislation and administrative regulations

In addition, the Center's second major function is to provide public education through publishing a newsletter, conducting workshops and conferences, providing reference information, developing position papers, and conducting courses in legal problems of the handicapped.

To date, major emphasis has been in the areas of right to treatment and the right to education.
