Ronald Betchtel, a senior majoring in biology from Montgomery, Alabama, was one of 10 college students from around the country who were selected to participate in the 1973 Summer Institute for Biomedical Engineering. This 10-week summer program was co-sponsored by the Goddard Space Flight Center and Howard University.

Ron and his partner, Rodney Creecy from Cornell University, worked on a problem in audiology, "The Use of Speech-Modulated-White Noise to Differentiate Hearers and Feelers Among the Profoundly Deaf."

All of the participants presented the results of their studies on August 16 at the Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, Maryland. A second hearing impaired student, William Griffin from NTID, was among this summer's group of students.

In addition to Ron's problem in clinical audiology, the other students worked in the areas of electrocardiography, anesthesiology, pediatrics and orthopedics.

(4) Intolerable - (a 10 min. black and white 16 mm film with sound) - Produced by NTD, this is an experimental film which is intended as an educational entertainment film to teach basic vocabulary to deaf

children. Rental fee - \$14.
