The College has been awarded \$40,000 for the first of a three-year grant by the Bureau of Higher Education to fund a new program of special services for disadvantaged students.

The purpose of the program is two-fold: (1) to provide support services of tutoring, counseling and near-peer advising to culturally or economically disadvantaged students at Gallaudet and (2) to provide interpreting and/or note-taking services to Gallaudet students enrolled in Consortium courses.

Diane Smith, a 1969 graduate of Howard University, who is completing her masters in counseling at Gallaudet, is heading the program.

CONFERENCE ON PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT FOR AND WITH THE DEAF

The Office of Public Service Programs and the Cooperative Extension Service of the University of Maryland will co-sponsor a national Conference on Program Development for and with Deaf People at the College from October 9-12.

Teams from Florida, Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts, North Carolina, Pennsylvania and Virginia will be discussing the best means of meeting the needs of deaf citizens through Cooperative Extension Services and related community resources.

Each state team will be composed of five persons: a deaf person, a cooperative extension leader, an extension volunteer and two representatives from other interested agencies.

COX NAMED COMMUNITY EDUCATION DIRECTOR

James Cox has been named director of the Center for Community Education. Prior to his accepting the position at Gallaudet, he was planner-researcher for the Human Services Planning Council in Flint, Michigan. He did his undergraduate work at Purdue University, earned an MA at Central Michigan University and his PhD at the University of Michigan.

The new Center will introduce the community education concept -- a concept for bringing the community, school and home more closely together in order to develop a more total positive learning environment -- to schools for the deaf throughout the United States.
