REGISTRATION OPEN FOR SIGN LANGUAGE CLASSES

Registration for spring semester evening sign language courses will be held on January 9 and 10 in the Sign Language Programs Office, College Hall, from 5-8 p.m. Staff and faculty may register during working hours as well.

Due to the energy crisis, classes have been reduced to three hours a week and are scheduled from 6:30-9:30 p.m. one evening a week and from 5-6:30 p.m. twice a week.

Course offerings include Beginning I and II, Intermediate I and II, Advanced I and II, Introduction to Interpreting and Reverse Interpreting. In addition a sixweek course in expressive and receptive fingerspelling will be given.

NEWS FROM THE SENSORY COMMUNICATION LAB --The National Institute of Neurological Diseases and Stroke has extended its grant to the Sensory Research Communication Laboratory for auditory research. The three year grant totals \$213,743 in direct costs.

Research on the perception of complex sounds by the deaf was started by the College ten years ago and has received support from NIH for the past nine years.

Ellen Danaher is principal researcher, and James Pickett is project director.

--Dr. William Strong has joined the Sensory Communication Research staff as a visiting research associate.

Dr. Strong is on sabbatical leave from Brigham Young University where he is an associate professor of physics. A specialist in the areas of acoustics, research on musical instruments and computer analysis of speech, he will be working with the Lab's computer system to study the speech of deaf persons.
