

### GALLAUDET EVALUATING CAPTIONED PROGRAMS

The Office of Educational Technology has a contract with the Public Broadcasting System to assist in the evaluation of two "closed captioning" techniques, which permit a TV viewer to elect to see captions or not by turning a switch on his television set.

Jacksonville and Washington will participate in special viewings of captioned programs using these two systems during the months of February through May.

Gallaudet College will receive data after each viewing for analysis. On February 17 and 18, community coordinators and station coordinators from the 12 cities will be meeting at PBS and Gallaudet College for a workshop on the captioning and distribution process and training on the data collection process.

The project is headed by Don Torr and staffed by Kanny Kannapell and Earl Higgins. Gil Delgado, Horace Reynolds, Peter Ries and Clarence Williams are providing consulting support.

### ENERGY AND YOU!

Measures to conserve energy at the College have been recently outlined. Some of the major steps being taken at this time are:

 Thermostats will be lowered to 68<sup>°</sup>.
All but one radiator will be cut off in each room.

3. Depending on outside temperature, as many boilers as possible will be cut off

for a portion of the day.

4. As many buildings as possible will be closed during night hours and thermostats will be reduced.

5. The use of buildings will be restricted on weekends.

6. Lower electrical wattage will be placed in hallways.

7. Domestic hot water will be shut off in non-essential areas.

8. Air conditioning thermostats will be set at 80°.

All of us can cooperate in this effort by: (1) keeping windows and exterior doors closed, (2) opening drapes and shades during the day to let sunlight enter and closing them at night to keep cool air out, (3) wearing warmer clothes as opposed to turning up thermostats, (4) using only necessary lights and (5) reducing the use of College-owned vehicles as much as possible.

Tom Lillis, as coordinator for the conservation of energy on Kendall Green, will implement these procedures. In addition, individuals have been designated as energy conservation coordinators for the main buildings on the campus. They are: College Hall, Judy Meade; Chapel Hall, Judy Bortner; Library, Lee Putnam; Hearing and Speech, Bill Mullen; Gym, Dorothy Hamberg; SUB, Phil Kerstetter; Kendall Hall, Ernest Moncada; Dawes House, Philip Goldberg; Auditorium, Jo Tracy; Kendall School, Fran Parrota; Art Center, Helen Sullivan; Counseling Center, Claire Timmons; Gate House, Bill Farran; Receiving, Elmer Tapscott; and MSSD, Ken Carlton.

These people will make periodic inspections of their respective buildings to determine if these measures are being carried out. If you have any suggestions of additional ways to conserve energy, please contact one of these individuals or Tom Lillis.
