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

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Fotomat Visits, Writes About OSD

"Learning Photography in a Silent World" is the title of an article in the April edition of *Fotofax*, the monthly publication of Fotomat Corporation. *Ms. Jacqueline Farmer*, assistant editor of *Fotofax*, gathered the material for this article when she visited the campus in February of this year.

Since 1973, Fotomat Corporation has quietly underwritten photography education for elementary and junior high school students in schools for the deaf. The result of Fotomat's continuing interest in both photography and deaf youngsters has been the development of a Learning Photography Program which is unique in both photography and education. This "kit" which was created for use as a photography learning club on the elementary and

junior high school levels has been offered to twenty-four schools in the country. At OSD the program has been integrated into the regular vocational curriculum.

"The text is terrific," says Mr. Charles Gramly, OSD vocational teacher. "It is visually oriented as our children are."

Although OSD started its first photography program in 1971, it is doubtful if the program would have survived without Fotomat's help. Between twelve and fifteen students enroll each semester in the eighteen week course. The classes are taught on two levels -- exploratory and advanced. "Our students," Mr. Gramly says, "have benefited in many ways. They feel a great sense of accomplishment in photography."
