Dr. Collins Speaks

Dr. James Collins, assistant chairman of the department of exceptional children at the Ohio State University, gave a two-day in-service presentation for OSD teachers and administrators on campus, February 14-15.

In his initial lecture, "Classroom Management in the Residential

Environment," Dr. Collins stressed the need for the classroom teacher "to create a climate which will enhance the learning process; to develop self-management skills in students; to develop social as well as academic skills with students so that they can enjoy getting along with peers; to establish independent, responsible attitudes in all students."

In his second lecture, "The Residential School in the Year 2000," Dr. Collins noted the changes which have recently occurred in both the residential school population and its method of instruction. In the future, he expects the residential school to emphasize its programs on the middle elementary and high school levels as the number of primary students enrolled in residential schools continue to decline. He also foresees greater cooperation between the residential school and the public school system.

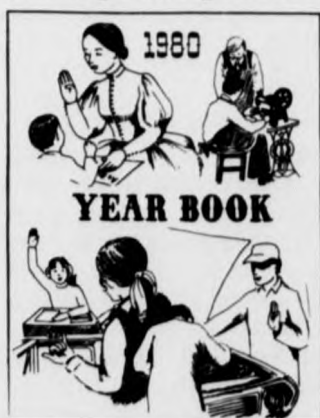

Sports -- An Integral Part of the OSD Program

Throughout its 150 years of service to the hearing-impaired of Ohio, the Ohio School for the Deaf has promoted interscholastic sports. From early times in OSD's history when the "Independents" played such teams as Ohio State in football to the present, OSD's teams have proved formidable opposition to teams of both hearing and deaf players.

The challenge of competitive sports has given OSD students throughout the years a chance to show, in a positive way, that deafness is "no handicap" when competing with hearing peers. Sports have also provided an incentive for youngsters to improve their scholastic achievements and develop leadership both in and out of the sports arena. Character development and a sense of fair play follow naturally from participation in any competitive sport.

Today, the OSD Spartans field four interscholastic teams as Ohio State University in football to the present, OSD's teams have proved formidable opposition to teams of both hearing and deaf players.

In comparing programs for hearing-impaired youngsters in Ohio, certainly the opportunity to compete in interscholastic sports which OSD offers all students must stand out as a giant plus. How many hearing-impaired youngsters in day school programs

can actually try out and make the team? Occasionally, there is an exceptional hearing-impaired athlete, who can compete, in any school, but he is rare. No OSD youngster is told that he should not bother to go out for the team because he cannot develop the skills necessary to play well.

Our teams are made up of deaf youngsters who want to play. Our coaches understand their players and can accentuate the abilities of each one. The players understand each other and can, I believe, adjust to the problems which stem from their hearing losses. Games between hearing schools and OSD provide our students with the opportunity for competition with their hearing peers. Games with other residential schools for the deaf provide the opportunity to compete fairly with other hearing-impaired students.

As I look at the total impact of our sports program, I see other opportunities. A deaf girl can become a cheerleader and a homecoming queen. All OSD boys and girls can become active supporters of their school and its teams.

In essence, sports at OSD provide the opportunity for our youngsters to stand together as a group with pride in their school and a comradeship of togetherness through the accomplishments of its teams.

The OSD Alumni Association tried to have one established when *Governor White* was head of the State. Politics spoiled it. Several times after other efforts also failed.

State Representative Troy Lee James of the 9th District, Cleveland, now has House Bill #805 scheduled for its fourth hearing. At the first meeting OSD *Principal Merlen Gruenhagen* and *Dr. James Flood* attended the first effort to get the bill moving - a press conference at the State House. The following meetings saw a much larger group of the deaf and their friends present to testify in support of the bill. No opposition is known.

Columbus Colony has quite a few former Ohio schoolers working and living at the community. Included are *Howard* and *Mrs. Gilbert Dotson Angel*, *Mr. and Mrs. Howard Liggett*, *James Flood*, *Jay Brown*, *Amanda Carlisle*, *Ione Dix*, *Emma Lou Henshaw*, *Charles Liggett*, *Vera Lubaski*, *Thurman Miller*, *Oleta Jacobson*, *Lorene Montoney*, *Lucille Murphy*, *Dorothy Postle*, *Angelina Pierulla*, *Jeanette Scofield*, *Hugh Wright* and others.

Dedication is being planned for May 3 or after. U.S. Commissioner on Civil Rights, *Dr. Arthur Fleming*, has indicated he will try to be present to speak. The Colony staff is busy arranging details.

Mr. Charles Gramly was out to Columbus Colony several times to take colored slides. They are being shown to clubs and other organizations of the hearing to raise money to help support Columbus Colony.

The new single apartments (106) are filled. Some double bedroom apartments are not. The U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HUD) rules make it difficult to rent them.

Residents come from California, Michigan, New Jersey, Florida, Kentucky, etc. All are welcome till they have a Columbus Colony of their own.

The *Chronicle* is a much improved paper. Readers like it.

The OSD Alumni *News* lost its elderly editor, *Harry Carlisle*, who built it up until health problems made the job too much for him. A new man is being sought for the job. Circulation is over 800.
