SCHOLARSHIP AID BILL PASSED

The state of Maryland has passed a bill which will provide scholarship assistance to teachers of the deaf. Residents of the state of Maryland who are senior undergraduate students and candidates for master's degrees in the education of the hearing impaired can apply for one of thirty scholarships to be awarded annually.

Each recipient after receiving certification must teach in a school for the deaf, a public school program or a state approved non-public school program for hearing impaired persons in the state for a minimum period of one year for each year's scholarship.
