Also a frequent performer on the BBC, he has toured his one-man show through Europe; and last year he spent five weeks in the Soviet Union as an artist in residence with the Moscow Theatre of Gesture and Mimicry.

Kendall Green consists of 26 buildings and nearly 800,000 square feet of space which are all kept in operating condition by the Physical Plant.

The day to day operations of the entire campus with regards to the heating, utility distribution system, mechanical systems and maintenance of all facilities are handled by John Gateau with the support of John Boykin and Jim Hull and their respective staffs in the heating plant and maintenance shop.

Divided equally between a day and night shift, 44 people comprise the building operations staff which takes care of all housekeeping as well as providing support for all special campus events.

The grounds department is supervised by Marty Willigan and maintains all grass, plant life, parking lots, roads, athletic facilities, walk ways and exterior storm drains.

The maintenance, repair and renovation of the College's residence halls are coordinated by Dick Hoke.

As construction manager, Murray Smith coordinates administrative and field matters pertaining to construction. He also assists in the planning of new facilities and remodeling or renovation of existing facilities.

Tom Lillis, director of the Physical Plant, monitors and supervises all activities within the department. As a service oriented department, the Physical Plant is striving to keep everyone happy with their physical surroundings on Kendall Green.
