CHILDREN'S TELEVISION WORKSHOP....
....in conjunction with WETA, channel 26,
will broadcast the Dick Cavett "Feeling
Good" Show in visible caption, Tuesday
afternoons, 1:00 till 1:30.

The same show has begun experimenting with "invisible captions," a technique that could eventually allow all TV shows to be captioned, but with a "decoder" device that would, in effect, filter out the captions for those who hear the audio.

Captioned TV on regular network shows will undoubtedly bring the added benefit of earlier reading skills to all children.

BICENTENNIAL EXHIBITION....
...at the Library of Congress already open, through 1976. Its title, "To Set a Country Free," is borrowed from Thomas Paine's AMERICAN CRISIS; and the exhibition includes many souvenirs of the Revolution, including the rough draft of the Declaration of Independence, handwritten by Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, and Benjamin Franklin. Also included are a first edition of Paine's pamphlet COMMON SENSE, printed in 1776, and many more

little-known and famous works and artifacts. The exhibition celebrates the 175th birthday of the Library of Congress, the world's most complete library, even though it's been twice gutted by fire. The Library administers a nationwide program of service to the blind and physically handicapped through a network of 54 cooperating libraries.
