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GALLAUDET DAY NEARS

On December 10, schools for the deaf throughout the nation will be honoring Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet, the father of deaf education in the United States.

As a young man, Gallaudet became acquainted with Alice Cogswell, the deaf daughter of a neighbor in Hartford, Connecticut. In 1815, Dr. Cogswell, Alice's father, and a small group of people from the Hartford community who were concerned about the lack of educational facilities for deaf children commissioned Gallaudet to travel to Europe and study how to establish a school for the deaf.

While in France, Gallaudet met a young deaf teacher, Laurent Clerc, who returned to America with Gallaudet. Together they established a school for the deaf in Hartford. The school, which became the American School for the Deaf, was the first permanent public school for the deaf in the United States.

Gallaudet's son, Edward Miner Gallaudet, became the first president of the College. In 1894, the collegiate division of the then Columbia Institution for the Deaf and the Dumb was renamed Gallaudet College in honor of Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet. The name of the entire corporation became Gallaudet College in 1954.

We will also honor Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet. Following College tradition, the Prep Class will place a wreath on the Gallaudet statue in front of Chapel Hall. The cere-

mony is at 7 a.m. The Potomac-Alexandria and McLean Lions Club will hold a special breakfast meeting at 7:30 p.m., in the Student Union Building. All faculty, staff and students are invited to participate and to pay homage to this great American educator.

THIRD SYMPOSIUM PLANNED

The third all-Gallaudet symposium is being planned for January 21 and 22, in the Student Union Building. The special topic will be "Educational Development Research Problems."

All those interested in making a presentation are welcome to send, bring or phone in a topic to Joan Allerton by January 12.

The October symposium, which explored the role of research and "Language and Communications Research Problems," was very well attended. A proceedings of the 28 presentations will be published sometime this month.
