## Peet Hall renovation nears completion

The \$1 million renovation of the Elizabeth Peet Residence Hall is nearing completion, and the dormitory should be ready for occupancy before fall semester classes begin next month.

Renovation work included installing new wiring, plumbing, fixtures, a fire alarm system and a new elevator. A major portion of the renovation work centered on the installation of a heat, ventilation and air conditioning system (HVAC). With the renovation of Peet Hall, all dorms on campus are fully air conditioned.

Constructed in 1957 and dedicated to Elizabeth Peet, dean of women at Gallaudet from 1910 to 1951, the fivestory building can accommodate 190 persons. It will serve as living quarters for sophomores, juniors and seniors. As with all residence halls, Peet Hall will be physically accessible to persons with mobility impairments. of PACE Throughout the week, classes were offered in the morning and afternoonthe first dealing with adjustment to hearing loss and the second with hearing, understanding and help.

Adjustment to hearing loss provided participants with strategies for improving communication. Personal and communication problems associated with hearing loss were discussed and related to life span adjustment. Ways of coping with those problems were then discussed and alternative communication strategies presented.

The second class—Hearing, Understanding and Help-covered normal hearing and hearing loss related to age. Discussion focused on hearing aids and how to find competent audiologists and other hearing-related resources. Hearing evaluations were also given to some of the Elderhostel participants.

Instructors for the classes were: William McFarland, chairman of the Audiology Department; Harriet Kaplan, an assistant professor in the Audiology Department; and Teena Wax, an assistant professor in the Department of Counseling.

After classes each day, participants could choose from a number of activities offered on campus. Those activities included a lecture on deaf culture by Simon Carmel, rap sessions led by Teena Wax, sign language instruction and the showing of captioned

## Adult basic education workshop held

The Adult Basic Education Program, an office under Programs in Adult and Community Education (PACE), sponsored its third annual workshop entitled "Working with Disadvantaged Deaf Adults" June 25-27.

Designed for teachers and administrators of A.B.E. programs to provide suggestions and share information on how to meet the needs of individual students within class structures, the workshop was conducted by Nancy Pollock, an Adult Basic Education (A.B.E.) specialist.

Twenty-three participants represented programs involving basic education, independent living and General Education Degree instruction from 15 states

and Canada.

Topics presented during the workshop included: "Literacy in the U.S.: The State of the Art," by Betty Ward of the U.S. Department of Education; "Characteristics of Deaf Adult Learners," presented by Roslyn Rosen, dean of the College for Continuing Education; "Materials Development," by Leslie Proctor, a materials development specialist with PACE; "Assessment and Evaluation," by Judy Johnson of the Department of Education at Gallaudet; and "Factors Which Influence Successful Programs" by Alex Quaynor, head instructor with A.B.E.
