BELL ASSOCIATION PRESENTS PAPERS

The Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf has given the College a rare collection of periodicals, books and papers. Among the 4000 bound volumes is an extensive collection of periodicals from the Little Paper Family, a group of publications published by schools and organizations for the deaf. Many of the items of the collection date back to the nineteenth century.

The materials have been gradually transferred from the Volta Bureau to our Library during the past year and are presently being shelved in the Edward Miner Gallaudet Room. The information will be put on microfilm.

Dr. Breunig, president-elect of the A.G. Bell Association, and Mr. Miller from the Volta Bureau staff, accepted on behalf of the Bell Association a citation of appreciation presented by our Board of Directors at last week's meeting.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION PLAN ACCEPTED

The College received notice last week from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare that our Affirmative Action Plan had been approved. The plan sets forth goals by the College to overcome the institution's underutilization of women and minorities in faculty and staff positions.

Any organization which holds a government contract of \$50,000 or more and has 50 or more employees must have such a plan. Gallaudet is one of only six other colleges or universities in Region III, which includes Maryland, D.C., Virginia, West Virginia and Pennsylvania, to have its program for affirmative action accepted by HEW.

DR. ELSTAD INTRODUCES NEW WIFE TO CAMPUS

Dr. Leonard Elstad, who retired as president of Gallaudet College in 1969, visited Kendall Green during Commencement week. His new wife, whom he married in January, accompanied him.

At the opening of the Board of Directors meeting, Dr. Elstad introduced his new bride and explained that he had finally married his college sweetheart who turned him down in 1922. The Elstads are maintaining homes in Minnesota and Georgia.
