First Presidential Awards fund 32 projects

Thirty-two projects proposed by College and Pre-College faculty members will be funded through the first Presidential Awards program.

The awards program was announced last fall by Gallaudet President Jerry C. Lee, who stated that the program is aimed in part at stimulating interest in identifying projects or formulating ideas which could contribute to quality academic programming and encouraging faculty members' active participation in such work.

"Oftentimes the pursuit of a creative idea that could enhance Gallaudet's academic mission must be delayed, postponed or cancelled because of inadequate funding. Departmental budgets may not be able to absorb expenses beyond those incurred or projected for regular program needs," Lee explained. "While external grant sources may be pursued, the competition is very keen and the project scope, in most cases, must impact beyond the walls of Gallaudet College."

The annual Presidential Awards program was created to address that issue. Out of more than 60 applications submitted by College and Pre-College faculty members, the following faculty members received funding for their proposals:

Bookstore selling **IBM** computers at discount prices

The Gallaudet College Bookstore is selling IBM computers and related materials. Through an agreement with IBM, the College is able to offer the computers at discount prices. Customers are limited to the purchase of one system.

In order to simplify the buying process, the bookstore has packaged a variety of systems-each of which is complete. The systems are operated on either the PC Junior, the PC or the XT in the following configurations:

• PC Junior: The PC Junior has a

128k memory, 360kb diskette drive, two cartridge slots, DOS 2.1, keyboard cord and the basic cartridge. The system can be purchased with a T.V. connector for \$825 or with a color display unit for \$1,075.

PC: The PC has a 256k memory with two 360kb diskette drives and DOS 2.1. Without a display unit, the system sells for \$1,521.50. With a monochrome display unit, the system sells for \$2,186.50, and with a color graphics display, the system is available for \$2,465.80.

• PC-XT: The XT has a 256k memory with a 360kb diskette drive, a 10MB fixed disk, and DOS 2.1. Without a display unit, the system sells for \$3,201.50. With a monochrome display unit, the system sells for \$3,569, and with a color graphics display, the system is available for \$3,848.30.

Prices are subject to change without notice. Taxes and shipping charges are not included in the prices cited above. Any of the systems can be purchased with an IBM graphic printer for an additional \$345.75.

Eagles chosen 1984 Deaf Prep **National Champs**

The MSSD football team was chosen by the Deaf American as the Deaf Prep National Champions for the 1984 season. The selection was made by a vote taken from coaches of deaf high school teams across the country

The Eagles dethroned the 1983 champion team from the Indiana School for the Deaf and edged out the team from the Alabama School for the Deaf, which placed second. This is the fourth championship the MSSD team has won under the direction of coach Bob Westermann. The team was picked by the Deaf American as the champs for the 1979, 1980 and 1981 football seasons. The 1984 season was Westermann's last coaching the high school team. He is now head coach of the College's football team.

The criteria used by coaches in choosing the Deaf National Prep Champions included the team's overall record (MSSD had eight wins, one loss and one tie) and scores against other deaf high school teams. They also considered how teams finished in any local conference to which they belonged. MSSD captured second place in the Tri-State Athletic Conference. Last year the Eagles won first place.
