CAMPUS ZONE PARKING PLAN

The Gallaudet College Parking Committee has approved a zone parking plan for Kendall Green effective at the beginning of the Fall Semester, 1978.

All available campus parking has been grouped into six parking zones. Each zone has been designated by letter and color. Parking spaces within zones have been allocated according to data contained in Department of Security vehicle registration files. All campus registered vehicles will be required to display parking zone discs and to be parked within their assigned zone. Zone F (black) will serve as the overflow zone.

Parking lots will be marked with signs placed at entrances. Curb zones will be marked with curb stencilling and four foot colored poles.

Enforcement of these new regulations will begin on September 4, 1978. You are urged to come to DOSS Headquarters, Chapel Hall, lower level, mall side, between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, to pick up your zone discs, a copy of the color coded zone parking map and a copy of the new Gallaudet Regulations. Avoid the last minute rush!!

WSSC ANNOUNCES 24 HOUR COMMUNICATION SYSTEM

The Washington Suburban Sanitary
Commission recently expanded its communication system for the deaf and hearingimpaired by establishing around-the-clock
telecommunicator service for customers in
Montgomery and Prince George's Counties.

The Commission's first TV-phone unit was installed in November 1977 and has been operational during weekday hours only. The enlarged system includes an additional TV-phone unit situated in the Maintenance Management Radio Room, so that off-hours emergency calls will be directed to the on-duty operator for response. The TV-phone user need only dial the one Commission number, 277-2314, and the switching of calls will be handled within the WSSC.

WSSC hearing impaired customers can contact the Commission regarding billing inquiries, water and sewerage systems, maintenance and emergency situations that may arise at any time during the day.

INTERNATIONAL YOUTH CHORAL FESTIVAL

EMERGENCY ALARM SYSTEM

The Department of Safety and Security has installed an Emergency Alarm System to provide a means for hearing-impaired persons to summon immediate assistance from security officers in emergency situations. There are 22 locations on campus where orange-colored buttons have been installed. When pressed, these buttons activate an alarm at Safety and Security Headquarters. When an alarm is sent (one touch of the button is all that is necessary) a radio operator will read the location and dispatch a security officer to the scene.

It is of great importance that the person activating the alarm remain at the location until the security officer arrives — usually within a couple of minutes. The system should be used in emergency situations only. You are requested not to use the system to gain access to buildings if you've forgotten your keys; to get directions or to learn the whereabouts of friends. These inquiries can be made at Security Headquarters, Chapel Hall.
