# SUB & ELY HALL PROGRAMS TO BE RELOCATED

The Student Union and Ely Hall are scheduled to undergo a multi-million dollar renovation. Before any work can begin in either building all programs currently in those buildings must be relocated elsewhere on campus for about two years. Programs in Ely Hall (SBG, Student Special Services, Counseling & Placement Center, Theta Nu Tau and Alpha Sigma Pi fraternities and the National Center for Barrier Free Design) are scheduled to be relocated by August 15, and programs in the SUB (Post Office, Bank, Bookstore, Rathskeller, Campus Ministries and Student Union Office) are to be relocated by October 1.

--COUNSELING & PLACEMENT CENTER will relocate to Kendall Hall, which will be remodeled to accommodate them. However, there are three programs in Kendall Hall and each will be relocated around July 2 -- Buff and Blue and Tower Clock will move to House 2 (2nd & 3rd floor) and dsh Abstracts will move to House 3.

--STUDENT SPECIAL SERVICES will move to the first floor apartment and lobby of Krug Hall.

--STUDENT BODY GOVERNMENT will relocate to the 7th & 8th floor lounge and apartment in Clerc Hall.

--NATIONAL CENTER FOR BARRIER FREE DESIGN will move to the Gate House.

--THETA NU TAU & ALPHA SIGMA PI FRATER-NITIES will occupy the basement of House  $\overline{2}$  &  $\overline{3}$  respectively.

--STUDENT UNION OFFICE will relocate to the small room in the upper level of the

dining hall.

-- POST OFFICE & BANK will move to the basement of College Hall.

--BOOKSTORE will occupy the basement of Peet Hall.

-- CAMPUS MINISTRIES will move to the first floor of House 2.

-- RATHSKELLAR will relocate to the recreation room of Dorm V.

Additional articles will appear from time to time in ON THE GREEN to keep the campus informed of the SUB/ELY relocation plan. History has shown that students, faculty and staff have weathered 10 years of on-going construction, detours and parking problems quite well and we should be able to adjust to the relocation with a minimum amount of confusion and inconvenience.

#### CAMPUS PLANS AND MODEL DISPLAY

In order to bring our recent visiting alumni members up-to-date on campus planning a series of new construction and renovation plans as well as the Landscape Master Plan and campus model were displayed in the HMB Lounge and the hallway just outside. The Planning Office urges you to take a little time out of your day to see this exhibit.

Plans for the Old Gym, Learning Center, Dorm V and SUB/ELY renovation are in the hallway. The Landscape Plan and model are displayed in the Lounge. The model presents a three dimensional view of Kendall Green in the future and the Landscape Plan provides a colorful and detailed representation of the trees, shrubs and pathways that are planned. Together, the plan and model should give you a good idea of what's in store for the future.
