## EMERGENCY BUILDING TEMPERATURE RESTRICTIONS

The President of the United States has enacted into law mandatory restrictions on indoor temperature levels as a national conservation measure. These temperature levels are a maximum of 65 degrees in winter and a minimum of 78 degrees in the cooling season. The designated term of this emergency is July 16, through April 16.

Gallaudet College will comply with this law within the limits of our equipment and exemptions. Generally, exemptions at Gallaudet will be occupied dormitories, Health Service, KDES, any nursery school or day care area and certain other limited areas housing computers and/or sensitive equipment.

Physical Plant will be converting the non-exempt areas to comply with these temperatures as promptly as possible. Those persons having window a/c units are cordially asked to cooperate and keep their areas much warmer than normal during the remainder of the summer. There are stiff penalties ranging up to \$10,000 per occupancy for willful disregard of this law.
