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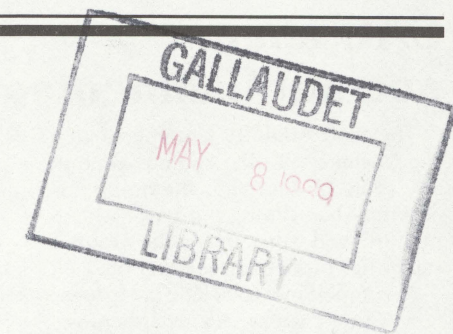

MSSD students get inside view of government through Close Up

Five MSSD students were among 1,200 high school students—both hearing and hearing impaired—from across the nation who immersed themselves in a hands-on lesson in civic awareness in the nation's capital April 2-7.

Their itinerary for the week included attending a lecture on defense at the Pentagon, meeting with their representatives and senators, sitting in on House of Representatives committee sessions, and touring Washington's landmarks. The whole group also visited Gallaudet one day and attended a lecture on deaf advocacy by Student Body Government leader Greg Hlibok.

The inside view of the workings of government was offered by Close Up, a nonprofit foundation whose mission is to promote civic responsibility in youth. A Close Up spokesman said that 27,000 students, with an average age of 16, participate in the program each year.

"I think they really get to see how the inner wheels of the government turn," said James Barrie, an MSSD social studies instructor and this year's sponsor of the MSSD group. "They get the inside viewpoint of government, meet government officials, and hear experts on government share their experiences."

MSSD students have been participating in Close Up since the mid-1970s. The students who choose to participate "all seem to be interested in extending their learning of government," he said.

Last October, 30 students expressed interest in attending the April session, but only five stuck with their goal through the winter months. To raise the \$630 per person fee, the students organized a number of promotions—a

bake sale at Christmas, gingerbread houses on Valentine's Day, selling cookies in their dorms, and offering greeting cards.

The MSSD students were part of a group based at an Arlington motel, where they spent three-hour evening workshops with Close Up instructors discussing their activities for the next day. Students were also given free time to take in city attractions.

On the final day, the students, along with the Close Up participants staying at five other motels around Washington, gathered for a banquet, talent show, and dance. "That was a really important part of the week for the students, meeting kids from all around the country," said Barrie.

SEHS hosts recent visit to Gallaudet by Chinese educators

Nine leaders of education in the People's Republic of China visited Gallaudet April 11-13 to learn more about how hearing impaired people at Gallaudet are educated and trained to become teachers.

The visit was hosted by the School of Education and Human Services (SEHS). As a part of its activity as a charter member of the USA/China Teacher Education Consortium, SEHS has set up a "sister school" relationship with a teacher training college in China's Liaoning Province, a highly populated area in northeast China.

The relationship involves the exchange of materials, the opportunity for teachers and future teachers in China to study education of hearing impaired students at Gallaudet, and the potential for faculty to provide guidance and leadership in China on education of hearing impaired students.

The visitors included the Commissioner of Education in Liaoning Province, the vice president of Liaoning Normal University (involved in teacher preparation), leaders of education in Qinghai Province, and leaders of the People's Education Press, the publisher of all school textbooks in China.

During their visit, the group discussed specific exchange activities between SEHS and Liaoning Province for 1989-90.

President King Jordan greeted the delegation. SEHS Dean David Martin gave an orientation to professional preparation, and Dr. Philip Schmitt, professor of education, discussed methods of educating hearing impaired students. The group also visited various sites at Gallaudet and participated in a special tour of Washington, D.C., including the embassy of the People's Republic of China.

SAC shares accomplishments

The Staff Advisory Committee would like to share with the campus community some of the things the group has accomplished during the past six months, and other things the group is still in the process of working on.

Accomplishments include the following:

- A non-cash service awards program was created to give employees with five through 40 years of service a choice of non-cash awards or bond, and a certificate. Effective Feb. 1, 1989.
- A sick leave bank was established for employees to draw upon in a time of crisis related to personal illness or injury. Effective Feb. 1-Sept. 30, 1989.
- A bridge position of administrative assistant was created to provide employees on the secretarial career path an additional opportunity for advancement. Effective fall, 1988.
- Secretarial levels A through G were assigned titles to better reflect job responsibilities. Effective fall, 1988.
- Two subcommittees were established to study compensation and benefits issues, and open forums to get feedback from employees were scheduled.

In addition, the Staff Advisory Committee is studying other issues:

- The possibility of adding biweekly sick and annual leave balances to pay stubs is under consideration.
 - A compressed biweekly work schedule from June through August is being discussed. It would allow employees to take one day off during each two-week pay period, if they worked the hours of that day during other days of the pay period.
 - A proposal for a community involvement program has been forwarded for consideration by the vice president for Administration and Business. The program would encourage faculty and staff to offer suggestions that may contribute to the growth and development of the University or have a positive impact on the resources of the institution.
 - The staff registration fee of \$30 required for summer sign language classes is being questioned in light of a refundable faculty registration fee.
- Employees with suggestions, comments, or new ideas can put them in writing to their Staff Advisory Committee representative.
